

Town News ... From the Desk of Town Supervisor Ernie Haywood

Our world has changed since the last Town of Bergen newsletter was issued. Our thoughts and prayers go out to all those who have become ill with COVID-19. We are also thinking of those who have been affected by COVID-19 in other ways: mental health issues, the loss of a job, closure of a business, separation from family and friends.

We have taken a leadership position to help our community during this time of crises. Working in collaboration the Town and Village has worked to assure for meals for the seniors and we coordinated a mask and sanitizer distributions. A special thank you to the Mayor for her and the Village crews' work with the establishment and operation of the meal program for senior citizens. We have tried to keep helpful information flowing on our town website and Facebook. We have also delivered essential services while keeping the public and employees safe.

While the Bergen Town Board has adopted a position of "we are all in this together," we have been dealt a potentially devastating financial blow by Genesee County. Nearly a quarter of the Town of Bergen's \$2.5 million annual budgeted is funded by revenue that was previously provided by the county the county uses revenue from the sales tax to provide this revenue to the town. On May 15, 2020, the Genesee County Legislature rescinded the revenue sharing plan that distributes this revenue across all towns, villages and schools in the county.

In light of this, the Bergen Town Board has undertaken a line-by-line review of the budget and have asked all departments to come up with a plan to reduce their budgets. We began this process with a special meeting of the board and department heads on May 16. We will move into the 2021 budget process earlier than normal this summer knowing that we will have to reduce expenditures proportionately to the reduction in the loss of county revenue as well as potential reductions in various forms of state aid.

The renovation of the library was completed just as the pandemic shutdown was beginning. The library project included the remodeling of restrooms and kitchenette; new carpeting; new electric and fire alarm system; accessible doors; new entryway; new circulation desk; new lighting; and the renovation of offices, multi-purpose and storage rooms. We had to cancel the April 25th ribbon-cutting ceremony, and although the library remains closed, we look forward to the day when the public can again partake in library services at this beautifully remodeled facility.

Residents may be wondering if the Town is continuing with the new water district. The answer is yes, as this funding is secure. The engineer is finalizing the plans for bidding and we are preparing to complete the necessary paperwork for financing. The plan remains to bid the work in the fall and start later this year with a completion of the entire system by the spring of 2022.

I would like to encourage all residents who have not already done so to fill out the 2020 Census. If you have misplaced your Census Form or need help, you can call the Census hotline at 844-33-2020. You can complete the census from the safety of your home. Some of our State Aid is tied to the census – it is important for you to be counted as a resident of Bergen! I encourage all to continue to practice social distancing and wear mask. Together as a community we all depend upon each other and together we will get through this. Be Safe- Be Well

Non-County residents must pay a mandatory \$5.00 fee for each dog, cat and ferret immunized. Each animal must be accompanied by someone who can control it.

Happy Spring! As the weather warms up and Spring finally arrives it gives us all a sense of optimism. We are all trying to remain positive and look for opportunities to weather this new reality of life with Covid-19. Just as life has changed for all of us at home it has also changed for every level of government. The reality is that we will all need to find ways to provide essential services to our community with less dollars. We need to have a thoughtful and creative approach to governing while providing services and infrastructure maintenance and improvements without pushing the burden on the backs of taxpayers.


We have all been hearing some of the challenges New York State is going to have for the next several years because of the economic impact this event has had. The Governor is currently contending with a budget deficit in excess of \$13 billion. The State is indicating that without federal support to help replace lost revenues, state aid to localities may have to be cut 20-50%. This will undoubtably have a trickle-down effect to municipalities and potentially taxpayers if we do not reimagine how we govern.

Counties are facing several threats to their financial resiliency. The first is declining revenues, especially sales tax, but also hotel occupancy taxes, mortgage recording taxes, and gaming revenues among others. Second, higher spending necessary to respond to this health emergency. Third, the likely loss of State reimbursement. And finally, the potential significant losses for small businesses on our main streets and rural areas that could threaten jobs and our property tax base long term.

Genesee County management has taken a proactive approach by looking for cost cutting measures immediately. The County has furloughed 49 employees, implemented a hiring freeze, stopped all capital projects, suspended all equipment purchases, suspended the jail project, and are taking a hard look at all outside agency spending, just to name a few.

These are unprecedented times that have impacted every aspect of our society, government and economy that no one could have predicted. So where is the good news?! Our region was among the first in the State to reopen. We will slowly see people go back to work and businesses get back on their feet. Our residents have done an exceptional job of following protocols and keeping our region relatively healthy. The response of all those essential employees, government workers, emergency management personnel, healthcare workers, grocery store clerks, etc, has been unbelievable. We have incredibly resilient people in Western New York and we all should be confident that we can weather this storm. We have a strong management team and leadership in the County as you all do with your leadership team in the Town and Village of Bergen. We look forward to partnering together to get through this and continue to provide all the services and protection a community needs.
